TOMORROW'S OUTLOOK

The GOP Leadership has announced the following schedule for Tuesday, June 18: The House will meet at 12:00 p.m. for legislative business. The House is expected to consider [H.R. 1797](#) – Pain Capable Unborn Child Protection Act (Rep. Franks – Judiciary) (Subject to a Rule) and begin consideration of [H.R. 1947](#) – Federal Agriculture Reform and Risk Management Act (Rep. Lucas – Agriculture) (Subject to a Rule). The House is also expected to consider several bills under suspension of the Rules.

"For years, House Republicans have clamored for a budget from the Senate. Now that they've got one, they're not sure what to do next.... But inaction may not be such a bad thing for House Republicans. Going to conference to match the House and Senate-passed budgets — or making any movement on the budget right now — could open up a schism in the caucus on spending that for months leadership has managed to keep mostly at bay. Some members see this as an opportunity to make a deal that makes permanent real budget cuts. There's a contingent that either doesn't want to make a deal with Senate Democrats or would prefer to wait until the debt ceiling is closer and they presumably have more leverage. And some would just toss the House-passed plan and start over."
